COURSE OBJECTIVES

PAPER: 211: History of English Literature: 1798-1832

At the end of this course, the students will be able to:

- 1. Analyze the major literary movements and socio-political trends in England between 1798 and 1832, and their impact on the literary genres like poetry and essay as well as literary landscape of the time. 2. Explore the thematic preoccupations of the Romantic poets and how these themes are reflected in their literary creations.
- 3. Investigate the reception and critical response to the works of prominent authors during this period, considering both contemporary reviews and modern interpretations.

- 2. Investigate the influence of Gandhian ideology on Indian English literature, studying how Mahatma Gandhi's principles got reflected in the literary works of that time.
- 3. Analyze the literary works of prominent authors like Rabindranath Tagore and R.K. Narayan, focusing on their unique literary styles, themes, and contributions to Indian English Literature
- 4. Examine the reception and impact of Indian English literature in the colonial and post-colonial periods, assessing how these works contributed to the cultural and intellectual landscape of India.
- 5. Explore the literary themes and motifs that were prevalent in Indian English literature during the Pre-Independence period by getting acquainted with major works.

PAPER: 213- Literary Criticism

At the end of this course, the students will be able to:

- 1. Understand the foundational principles of Western literary criticism by studying the works of influential ancient Greek and Roman critics such as Aristotle, Plato, Longinus, Horace etc.
- 2. Explore the major theoretical concepts and approaches to literature introduced by critics across Europe.
- 3. - 5. Critically appreciate and interpret literary work like a poetry applying theoretical frameworks introduced by classical critics.

PAPER-301: History of English Literature: 1832-1890 At the end of this course, the students will be able to:

- 1. Examine the political, social, and cultural developments that shaped the Victorian era, and understand how these factors influenced the themes and styles of literature during this period.

PAPER- 303 : Literary Criticism:

II At the end of this course, the students will be able to:

- 1. Explore the evolution of literary criticism from the Renaissance to the Romantic era, with a particular emphasis on the theories of the representative writers and how their theories reflect the changing literary and cultural landscapes of their respective times.
- 2. Examine the Classical Influences and how the English critical works were shaped by the ancient literary traditions and how to apply these principles to the contemporary English literary context.
- 3. Investigate Romantic and Aesthetics ideas about the imagination, nature, and the role of the poet, and how they challenged the prevailing neoclassical norms.
- 4. Analyze and interpret various literary and critical concepts as well as terminologies enriching critical perspectives
- 5. Understand the classical treatises on Indian aesthetics, such as Natya Shastra by Bharata Muni and Abhinavabhāratī by Abhinavagupta, to understand the philosophical underpinnings and the evolution of Indian aesthetic thought.

PAPER: 304 -EA History of Indian English Literature: Post-Independence and Modern Periods At the end of successful completion of this course, the students will be able to:

- 1. Trace the evolution of Indian English literature from the post-independence era to the modern period, identifying key literary movements and trends that emerged during this time.
- 2. Analyze and interpret significant literary works produced by Indian authors writing examining their themes, styles, and contributions to Indian literature.
- 3. Explore socio-political contexts that influenced the production of Indian English literature during the post-independence and modern periods, including issues of nationalism, cultural identity, and the impact of globalization.
- 4. Examine post-colonial theories and concepts to analyze how Indian writers in English responded to the legacy of colonialism and how their works contributed to the decolonization process.
- 5. Develop critical and analytical skills through close reading and interpretation of Indian English literary texts.

- 3. The student learns in detail the ancient to classical form of Epic poetry in Sanskrit literature. Beginning with the AdiKavi Valmiki's The Ramayana, MahaKavi Vyasa's The Mahabharata here. Not only the socio-cultural life reflected here is studied but also the philosophical aspect of these epics is also studied in detail in the form of The Bhagavad Gita. These epic makes the students aware of the morality of the times prevailing in ancient India. Along with the ancients epics of Sanskrit literature, the students learn in detail the Classical Epics of Sanskrit literature as well e.g. Raghuvansham by Kalida etc. Here a comparative as well as critical study of the socio-cultural and moral lives of the ancient and classical India is made by the students.
- 4. The student, as a form of Sanskrit literature, studies Katha Sahitya in Sanskrit literature e.g. Panchatantra & Hitopadesha by Pandit Vishnu Sharma and Pandit Narayana. The students get here the socio-cultural morality as well.
